
#### **Context Statement**

Whyalla Town Primary School caters for students from R-6. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2023 is 309. Whyalla Town Primary School is classified as Category 4 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 4% Aboriginal students, 25% students with disabilities, 3% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background, 2% children/young people in care. ## Performance Summary NAPLAN Proficiency

In 2023, the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) - a Commonwealth Independent statutory authority - announced changes to NAPLAN performance reporting. This new way of reporting by ACARA that NAPLAN results from 2023 will not be comparable to previous years. The new approach replaces the previous numerical NAPLAN bands and the national minimum standard.







#### **Attendance Comment**

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.

#### **Governing Council Report**

In 2023, Meleika Hobba continued in the Principal position, for her second full year.

2023 saw the return of several fundraising events, as well as the establishment of new events. We held several well-known fundraisers, notably the Mother's Day and Father's Day stalls and the annual Fun Run. 2023 also saw the inaugural 'Amazing Race' run, which saw over 100 school members participate in a race around Whyalla, which was supported by some amazing community members and organisations through donations and hosting of stations. In addition, we were also fortunate to hold a Schnitzel night at the Eyre Hotel. These events would not have been possible without the support of our amazing volunteers and school community.

Our canteen and Out of School Hours Care program (OSHC) both continue to provide our school community with excellent service. We are grateful to Wendy and her team for continuing to provide our students with delicious and high-quality food on a weekly basis. We welcomed Natasha into the role of OSHC Director in 2023, and we thank Natasha and her team for providing an OSHC program to support our families. OSHC is still a profitable service, with sourcing qualified staff as the main concern in 2024.

We continued to see improvements to our grounds and facilities in 2023 including a new grass area in the Junior Primary area, repurposing the old toilet block, improvements to the upper primary yard area, and the resurfacing of the quad.

2023 saw the initial phase of the re-branding process with the new logo approved. The first items to be rolled out with our new logo are the student school bags and reader folders. This will be a gradual process continuing into 2024.

Governing Council would not have achieved what it did in 2023 without the ongoing support, time and commitment from my fellow counsellors, Nicola, Sarah, Nikki, and Clare and I thank them for this. I also thank Meleika, Penny and Astrid for their ongoing commitment to Governing Council and supporting us with all our plans.
